- a. Identify and locate geographic features of ancient Egypt, including the Mediterranean Sea, Red Sea, Nile River and Delta, and the Sahara Desert. 4.14.A
- b. Explain the structure of ancient Egyptian society, including the relationships between groups of people and the role played by the pharaoh and enslaved people. 4.14.B
- c. Explain Egyptian beliefs about the afterlife, the reasons for mummification, and the use of pyramids. 4.14.C
- d. Describe the significance of key figures from ancient Egypt, including Queen Hatshepsut, Ramses the Great, and the significance of the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb on the modern understanding of ancient Egypt. 4.14.D
- e. Describe the achievements of ancient Egyptian civilization, including hieroglyphics, papyrus, and the pyramids and Sphinx at Giza. 4.14.E

- a. Identify and locate the geographic features of ancient Rome, including the Mediterranean Sea, Italian Alps, Rome, Italian Peninsula, and the Tiber River. 4.17.A
- b. Explain how the geographic location of ancient Rome contributed to its political and economic growth in the Mediterranean region and beyond. 4.17.B
- c. Describe the class system of ancient Rome, including the roles and rights of patricians, plebeians, and enslaved people in Roman society. 4.17.C
- d. Describe the polytheistic religion of ancient Rome and its connection to ancient Greek beliefs. 4.17.D
- e. Describe the characteristics of Julius Caesar's rule, including his role as dictator for life. 4.17.E
- f. Explain the influence of Augustus Caesar, including the establishment of the Roman Empire and its expansion during the Pax Romana. 4.17.F
- g. Describe how innovations in engineering and architecture contributed to Roman expansion, including the role of: aqueducts, domes, arches, roads, bridges, and sanitation. 4.17.G
- h. Describe the fall of the Western Roman Empire, including difficulty governing its large territory and political, military, and economic problems. 4.17.H

18. Describe the geographic, political, economic, and cultural structures of ancient China. 4.18

- a. Identify and locate geographic features of ancient China, including the Gobi Desert, Plateau of Tibet, Himalayan Mountains, Yangtze River, Pacific Ocean, and the Yellow River. 4.18.A
- b. Describe the influence of geographic features on the origins of ancient Chinese civilization in the Yellow River Valley, and explain how China's geography helped create a unique cultural identity. 4.18.B
- c. Describe problems prevalent in the time of Confucius and explain the concepts of filial piety (dutiful respect) and the Mandate of Heaven. 4.18.C
- d. Explain the significance of the unification of ancient China into the first Chinese empire by Qin Shi Huangdi. 4.18.D
- e. Describe how the size of ancient China made governing difficult and how early dynasties attempted to solve this problem, including the construction of the Grand Canal and the Great Wall. 4.18.E
- f. Explain the major accomplishments of the Han Dynasty, including the magnetic compass, paper making, porcelain, silk, and woodblock printing. 4.18.F
- g. Describe how the desire for Chinese goods influenced the creation of The Silk Road and began a process of cultural diffusion throughout Eurasia. 4.18.G

19. Describe the geographic, political, economic, and cultural structures of Indigenous civilizations of the Americas. 4.19

- a. Identify and locate geographic features in the Americas, including Mississippi River and Delta, Amazon River, the Pacific Ocean, Appalachian Mountains, Gulf of Mexico, Atlantic Ocean, South America, and the Yucatan Peninsula. 4.19.A
- b. Describe the cultural elements among Indigenous communities in the Americas, including housing, clothing, games/entertainment, dance, and how food was gathered/caught and cooked. 4.19.B
- c. Explain how nomadic groups of people first hunted and traveled throughout what would become Louisiana. 4.19.C
- d. Explain how people living in what would become Louisiana gradually moved towards seasonal hunting and gathering, using new tools and practices for hunting, and building large mounds for ceremonial and practical purposes. 4.19.D
- e. Describe key characteristics of Poverty Point culture, including art, hunting methods, dress, food, use of mounds, and resources traded there. 4.19.E
